


The Moroccan Migration History

- After 2nd World War, Germany's economic growth is strong.
- The economy calls for Labour Migration
- 1962, Germany signs with Morocco a contract about Labour Migration
- 1973, Germany cancels the contract due to global economic crisis

The Moroccan Immigration in Figures I




The Moroccan Immigration in Figures II



A theoretical model to explain return migration for retired migrants

- The goal is to explain under which conditions a return migration is considered by migrants.
- The first step is to identify relevant explanation factors for return migration by considering the research findings
- The second step is to verify the theoretical model to explain return migration
- At last is to identify the key factors for return migration

Theory & State of Research



Data

- The theoretical Model to explain return migration will be tested by using quantitative data.
- SOEP The German Socio-Economic Panel Study is a survey, which collect quantitative data of immigrants in Germany since 1984.
- Moroccan Immigrants are not surveyed. The reason is the small number of moroccan immigrants in germany.
- The model is tested for five other Immigrants groups to make a conclusion independent of ethnic groups








Probability for retired Immigrants


Results Model 1: Example – Health: Disability




Results Model 1: Example – Context: Climate in Host Country



Probability of Return




Results Model 1: Example – Contact Abroad




Conclusion


- Sex Male tends to return to Home Country
- Health Disabled Persons tends to stay in Host Country
- Home Country Language Proficiency as Indicator for Return Migration
- Host Country Language Proficiency as Indicator to stay
- Discrimination Experience/Bad Life Satisfaction as an Indicator for Return Migration
- Contact abroad positive correlated with return
- Income is negative correlated with return


The Age to go on pension




In the next decade the share of retired moroccan immigrants will be doubled.




Health an issue for people older than 55 years.
